

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High School Catalyst - MAC (ft. Axis)

TAThether it was by seeing red and white posters hanging around the high school hallways or hearing about a group called "Axis" in TTT, it soon became pretty clear to the high school students that this year's Catalyst retreat would be a little different.

On Friday, September 1st, every high school student in the entire Morrison system attended an event called "Axis" at the Morrison Taichung Campus. Early that morning, students were picked up from MAK, Tainan, and various other places in Kaohsiung for the two-hour bus ride up north. Upon arrival, they spent time with friends from other campuses until the first learning session in the auditorium. A worship team comprised of teachers from all three campuses began the first session by leading the entire Morrison high school community in worshipping God through music.

Afterwards, the invited speakers introduced themselves. Chad Rouse and Evan Baker had come to Taiwan as part of a circuit of Southeast Asia, speaking on behalf of the group Axis (hence the name of the Friday session). Their two presentations, given in the morning and afternoon respectively, were titled "Alone Together" and "We are What We Love." Both topics centered around the overarching theme "Marketplace of Ideas."

In these two sessions, Rouse and Baker led the student body to think critically about the way they use the internet and how what we spend our time doing (or viewing) shows our true passions, especially as those pursuits replace God. That afternoon, the assembled students then attended one of the two forums where the Axis speakers delved deeper into their two topics.

Later that evening, although the MAK and MAT buses had rolled off for home and Morrison Taichung students were let out of school, the campus was not abandoned for the night. Catalyst, the annual high school spiritual retreat, had just begun. While Axis was attended by every high school student, many students from all three campuses chose to stay the night for Catalyst. After a pizza dinner near the gym, students piled back into the auditorium for a session titled "Spend Yourself," in which the two Axis speakers elaborated further on the topic "Marketplace of ideas," explaining how different situations in first and third world countries set us up for different types of problems, such as physical versus mental bondage. This was followed by discussion groups made up of students from different campuses. Later, they played a round of underground church, the thrilling chase game that has become an annual Catalyst tradition.

The following morning included two more sessions by Rouse and Baker titled "Confidence for the Resurrection" and "What to Do with Doubt." In these two final talks, they encouraged the students to engage in their faith with both their hearts and minds, whether it be through examining apologetic and topics were commended by high evidence for Christ's resurrection or dealing rationally with doubt in themselves and others. These sessions were followed by the same discussion groups as the night before.

Also featured in this program were worship sessions (two Friday, one Saturday) led by worship teams from MAK, MAC, and MAT. There was also a senior advice panel for guys and girls.

Catalyst concluded with a speaker Q&A, a final time with the Axis speakers before boarding the buses and setting off for home.

Overall, students seemed to enjoy the event, especially the speakers who came from Axis. Their presentations schoolers as being "very effective," "actually very interesting," and "honest and straightforward." Mrs. and Mr. Kadow met during college. They are blessed with two wonderful children. Some of the couple's hobbies are traveling internationally, doing mission work, and going to amusement parks and beaches. Mr. Kadow also enjoys reading. Mr. Kadow shared a story about a time when his family went on an 18-days cross-country(not running) trip going to the Colorado Rocky Mountains:

"This was when Google Maps was in the first stages of development so accuracy wasn't very pinpoint like it is today. We were slowly moving up a dusty gravel road in the wild using a shortcut to find an entrance to a National Park to spend the night. We came to the top of the mountain and

3. Shoot, stop kicking me: Locker assignments by sport preferences




> "Considering the schedule [having to include] the electives, I think it was reasonable for the school to change the passing period. Nonetheless, it is true that this system is stressing the students.

our time to use the restroom which results in us holding in until lunch. That is really unhealthy. I don't Furthermore, no students want to




