Ms. Shaffner analyzes the elegant prose, writing, "This descriptor clearly serves two purposes: first, to 'dazzle' us as readers, but more importantly, to characterize Edward as a precious stone: rare, valuable, and desirable. Moreover, Meyer uses color to evoke other characteristics, too—Edward's white skin suggests purity that, combined with the 'flush' from hunting, brings to mind the color pink, a color culturally associated with youthful femininity. Meyer is subtly manipulating her largely teenage female readership by ostensibly portraying the love interest as a

[strong], larger-than-life hero figure, while subliminally transmitting the image of, essentially, pink jewelry." Meyer skill shines through, at once eliciting emotions from readers, characterizing the protagonist, and layering complexity. Her depiction of characters leaves little to be wanted. Huan says, "Edward's hot." Readers have thus savored these iconic scenes. "I really like the part where Hagrid shows up at the door and says, 'You're a wizard, Harry,'" Michael Tai, a junior, further shares. *Twilight* is clearly a book of masterful writing, deep meaning, and jaw-dropping scenes. In fact, many have even found *Twilight* profoundly impactful. "[*Twilight*] taught me what totally healthy relationships look like," Ms. Brown, who teaches English 4, states. For readers looking for love advice, it is quite apparent that *Twilight* is the best place to go. But *Twilight* goes much further than advice. "My life," Joshua says, "Was never the same after *Twilight*." This book is clearly rife with deep, universal lessons. Not only is it entertaining and literary; it will also change your life.
